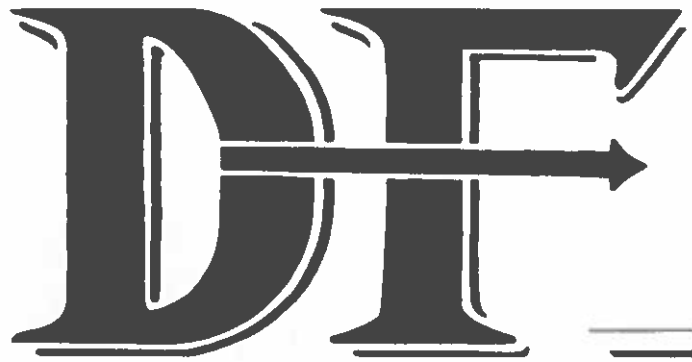

GREETINGS: In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town of Dover-Foxcroft in said County and State qualified by law to vote in Town affairs, to meet at the Dover-Foxcroft Municipal Building Gymnasium in said Town on Saturday, the 25th day of April, A.D., 2026 at 9:00 o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act upon the following articles:

ARTICLE 1

To elect a Moderator to preside at said meeting by written ballot.

ARTICLE 2

Shall the Town appropriate revenues anticipated in the amount of \$3,868,100 and appropriate additional funds including funds from surplus in the amount of \$885,000, for a total amount of \$4,753,100 to be used to reduce amounts to be raised from the property tax commitment to fund appropriations in subsequent articles, and; authorize the Board of Selectmen to appropriate an additional amount from surplus to reduce the property tax commitment?

ARTICLE 9

ARTICLE 10:

No building permit shall be issued to an applicant if there are any unresolved land use or zoning violations relating to the property for which the permit is being sought; provided, however, that this shall not prevent the issuance of permits to resolve the underlying zoning or land use violation.”

ARTICLE 11:

To see if the Town by written ballot open for voting until 8 P.M., shall adopt the following:

Shall the voters of the Town of Dover-Foxcroft appropriate and authorize a majority of the municipal officers of the Town to borrow on behalf of the Town, a principal amount not to exceed \$2,500,000 through the issuance of general obligation bonds or notes of the Town of Dover-Foxcroft which may be callable bonds or notes, the proceeds to be used for repairs and improvements of the Lincoln Street Bridge as further described in Lincoln Street Bridge Rehabilitation in the Town of Dover-Foxcroft (the “Project”), and to take any and all action including securing interim financing if necessary, and execute any and all contracts and documents necessary or convenient to issue the bonds or notes of the Town and to complete the Project.

Dear Friends:

It is an honor to represent Maine in the United States Senate, and I welcome this opportunity to share several key accomplishments for our state from the previous year.

As Vice Chair of the Appropriations Committee in 2024, I have secured nearly \$580 million for 230 projects across all of Maine's 16 counties to promote job creation, workforce training, and economic development; expand access to health care; support law enforcement; improve public education and infrastructure; and protect our environment. As the new Congress begins, I am honored to be taking the helm of the Committee, the first Mainer to do so in nearly a century, and I remain committed to ensuring that federal spending produces real results for our state and nation.

Maine has the oldest average age in the country, which is why I have long prioritized health-focused legislative efforts. There were more than 1,860 health care bills introduced during the 118th Congress. Only 15 health care bills were signed into law, and I was a lead sponsor of five of them. These bills will enhance care for individuals with Alzheimer's, autism, and substance abuse issues through improved research funding, strengthened public health programs, and increased support for rural first responders.

Another important bill that I coauthored was the *Social Security Fairness Act*. Since 2003, when I led the first-ever Senate hearing on the Windfall Elimination Provision and the Government Pension Offset, I have sought to end these provisions of the *Social Security Act* that unfairly reduce the Social Security benefits that public employees or their spouses have earned. I am pleased to say that with the passage of my bill, the *Social Security Fairness Act*, in December, public sector retirees will now receive the full Social Security benefits they have earned.

When the Maine way of life was under threat, I was certain to defend the interests of our state. I worked to protect Maine's potato farmers when the Department of Agriculture tried to reclassify the potato from a vegetable to a grain. I thwarted efforts to consolidate USPS mail operations at the Hampden postal facility, which would have disrupted mail delivery throughout our state. I sounded the alarm with leaders at the FBI and Departments of State and Treasury on the spate of illicit marijuana growing operations that are destroying properties and providing refuge to foreign criminals in our state. Following damage to our working waterfronts after last winter's storms, I secured \$15 million to help fishing communities recover. I championed funding to support the Maine Air National Guard base, Bath Iron Works, and Portsmouth Naval Shipyard.

As of last December, I have cast more than 9,100 consecutive votes, continuing my record of never missing a roll-call vote since my Senate service began in 1997. My ranking as the most bipartisan Senator reflects Maine's tradition of working with a spirit of cooperation and respect.

Dear Friends,

I hope this letter finds you well. It's an honor to continue serving as your representative in Congress, and I take the responsibility very seriously. Thank you for the opportunity to share an update on the work I've been doing for the people of the Second Congressional District.

Fisheries: This spring, the Atlantic States Marine Fisheries Commission (ASMFC) announced a gauge increase for lobsters caught in the Gulf of Maine beginning in January 2025. Maine fishermen warned that this decision is founded on incomplete and inaccurate data. Additionally, this gauge increase could put Mainers at a competitive disadvantage to Canadian fishermen with looser regulations. That's why I sent a letter to the ASMFC urging them to delay their decision until they can evaluate data with fishermen, whose proactive stewardship provides invaluable insight. I have also submitted an amendment to this year's funding bill that would block federal funding from being used to implement and enforce a gauge increase. Because of these efforts, the ASFMC made the decision to delay the implementation of this new requirement. I'll always stand with Maine lobstermen against unfair, unnecessary regulations that threaten their livelihoods and industry.

Veterans: The first meeting I attended as an elected official was with a large group of veterans and the former Director of the Maine Bureau of Veterans Services. We discussed a lot, but one issue rose above the rest: how little was being done for Maine veterans who needed treatment for mental health issues or substance use. At the time, there were no in-patient treatment beds in Maine, so veterans had to wait for a bed to open up at an out-of-state facility. Fast forward 10 years, through unending red tape, and I'm delighted to report we just broke ground on a treatment facility at the Togus VA Medical Center in Augusta. This was the direct result of the tireless advocacy of veterans from across our state — this win is theirs.


Postal Service: This spring, the U.S. Postal Service (USPS) announced plans to consolidate and move some processing operations from the Eastern Maine Processing & Distribution Center in Hampden to Scarborough. This would have caused significant mail delivery delays that disproportionately harm rural communities. That's why I introduced the *Timely Mail Delivery and Postal Services Protection Act*, which would have halted this planned consolidation across the country. Following these efforts, the USPS announced they have scrapped their plan entirely. While this is a win for Maine, it is also evidence that we cannot become complacent. That's why I recently introduced the bipartisan *Postmaster General Reform Act*, which would establish term limits for the United States Postal Service's (USPS) postmaster general and require nominations to be confirmed by the Senate.

Regardless of the year, one of my top priorities is ensuring I'm accessible to you. My staff and I can help navigate federal programs; find resources in Maine; and resolve issues with Medicare, Social Security, the VA, and other federal agencies and programs. We are here to help:

The Budget Review Committee's Work on the FY 2024 2025 Town Budget

The Budget Committee met to review and comment on the town's fiscal year 20242023 budget. We met on February 29, March 7th, March 14th and March 21st, with a public hearing on March 26th. We reviewed the budgets for all of the town departments, including Library, Social Service, Welfare, General Government, Contingency & Abatement, Debt Service, Protection, Hydrants, Fire, Solid Waste, Recreation, Cemetery, Economic Development, Public Works, and Wastewater.

This budget reflects an increase in the net amount to raise of just over \$587,297. With expected increases in property valuations, and expected slight increases in school expenses, this will likely result in a mil rate close that of the current year – but, as always, final rates will be set upon determination of local valuation and school budget is finalized).

We had good discussions with all of the departments on their budgets. We dealt with significant issues in three different areas:

1. The Budget includes 3.5% increases and additional target increases to allow employees to fit within ranges established by a wage study recently completed. In addition, the town has initiated retention bonuses for employees based on years of service.
2. The Water District will shortly be making significant improvements to the town's water system. This necessitated an increase of approximately \$58,000 from previous years.
3. New in the budget is an appropriation for an Emergency Medical Service to supplement that provided by Northern Light
4. We have added a full-time grant writer and communications director. A significant portion of the town's activities are funded with grants for major projects, such as infrastructure, and relatively minor items such as air packs for the fire department. We believe that this position will more than pay for itself by increases in the number and amounts of new grants. Another major area in his responsibility will be communications, including a long overdue major upgrade to the town's website.
5. Capital expenditures include startup costs for the new Emergency Medical Services, Improvements in the solid waste and cemetery maintenance departments – including provision of water at the transfer station.
6. Two other major initiatives were discussed and approved by the committee. The first is implementation of a sidewalk maintenance plan requested by last year's committee. It was presented at our meetings and shows approximately \$3.5 million dollars in potential sidewalk repairs. \$100,000 was recommended in this year's budget to begin to work on those repairs.
7. Finally, much discussion took place on the town's gravel roads. We have requested a study, similar to that made some years ago for the streets and the recent sidewalk study. With this in hand we can begin to address improvements in our gravel roads.

The committee continues to recognize the excellent work that Jack Clukey, Lisa Ronco, Emmalee Reed, and the town's department managers have done not only to prepare the budget but to operate the town's department so well on such limited funds. I would also like to express my appreciation for the work done by the review committee – Lucas Butler, Sandy Perkins, Sean Letarte, Marc Poulin, Any Fagan-Cannon, Pete Dennis, Steve Robinson and Kathleen Thibault. It was truly an honor and a pleasure working with such a good group.

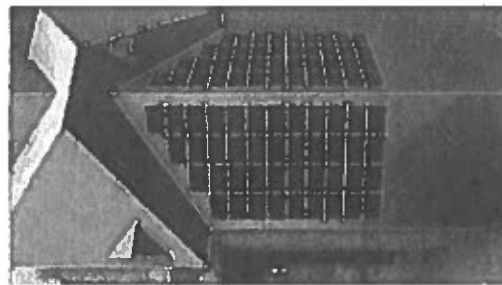

During Fiscal Year 2025, the Thompson Free Library continued to provide excellent service to our community while branching out on new endeavors and with new partners in our area. Thank you to Thompson Free Library's dedicated staff and volunteers Jon Knepp, Kim Brawn, Michelle Fagan, Andrea Koltai-Price, Pat Juska, Tom Lyford, and Shannen Rhoda who went above and beyond to meet the needs of our community.

Summer is always our busiest season and this year was no different! We enjoy bringing dynamic children's programming to the youth of our region. This year's highlight was definitely The Frogtown Puppeteers, which packed over 250 kids and their families into the Central Hall Commons to watch their presentation of *The Banana Kid*. Animals, science, authors, and more, as well as an end of summer party with ice cream rounded out the youth lineup. Meanwhile, engaging speakers like best-selling author Morgan Talty and concerts from groups like Some Reel People, Highlands Classical, and more brought in folks of all ages.

Michelle continued her Read and Feed program in the area, delivering fresh produce and books to numerous locations around Dover-Foxcroft, as well as sites in Monson, Sebec, Milo, Charleston, and Brownville! Working with Rowell's Garage and Piscataquis Regional Food Center, the program went from a pilot program last year to a well-loved part of our library this year.

Another highlight of the last year was the Art Walk that we collaborated with the Central Hall Commons and the Maine Highlands Arts Council to bring to Dover! Local potter Travis Sudweeks of Roseline Pottery demonstrated his techniques on the library lawn while Doug Webster and his Ice Dance International students skated on gl ice underneath the library pavilion. It was a great program and we were happy to bring it to our community.



Jan Brett is perhaps one of the best-known and most beloved children's authors in the country. Every year she does a van tour around the country where she visits towns that write the most compelling case for her to do so. Dover-Foxcroft was lucky enough in 2024 to have our own Michelle Fagan's essay be selected for Jan Brett's tour. We hosted her at the Center Theatre, where a packed crowd got to hear Jan speak and draw, then meet her adoring fans in our area. It was one of the best experiences we have ever been a part of.



One of the biggest improvements to the library facilities in years started this year when we began our solar array project. The array, consisting of eighty-four panels, will provide all of the library's electrical power for the foreseeable future. With the addition of heat pumps in the last few years, this means that the library's electrical and heating costs will decrease dramatically. Even better, thanks to grants from the Stephen and Tabitha King Foundation and the Maine State Library's Remote Worker Program, the project was completely

funded through grants. The project has since been completed and will be turned on and start generating before Spring 2026!

This year the library strengthened many community partnerships, working with Center Theatre, the Commons at Central Hall, Pine Tree Hospice, Reading with Erma, Piscataquis County Soil and Water Conservation District, Piscataquis County Emergency Management Agency, Piscataquis Regional Food Center, University of Maine Cooperative Extension Office, SeDoMoCha, IF & W, the Dover-Foxcroft Historical Society, Foxcroft Academy and others. Thank you to our community partners!

Thompson Free Library maintains a diverse collection of materials intended to encourage a love of reading, facilitate the exploration of ideas, and support the interests of our community members. At the library you can find offerings including current bestsellers as well as classics, fiction and nonfiction, large print books, graphic novels, magazines, audiobooks, DVDs, wifi hotspots, local history materials, access to e-books, audiobooks, streaming series and movies, and passes to visit Maine State Parks, The Maine Discovery Museum and The Coastal Maine Botanical Gardens, and others. Printing, scanning, faxing, and other services are available at minimal cost. The library continues to increase access to interlibrary loan materials through a resource sharing initiative within the Maine Balsam Libraries Consortium and beyond, through which we can request almost any book. Use the online catalog at www.thompsonfreelibrary.org to make requests from participating libraries across the state.

Each year the library provides detailed statistics to the Maine State Library. Highlights of Fiscal Year 2025 data include:
